in the past year, all events steered towards the year's Theme 自定「義」, which is to encourage the 'lesser-achieved' young people to perform Voluntary Community Service. They set their own service goals and they worked for it. As they went along their road of voluntary service, they are made aware that there are many others in the society who are much less fortunate. This led them to reflect on their own abundance and they are glad to be able to help others.

I should think that if they look even further, they will appreciate that children like them who grow up in Hong Kong are much happier/luckier than those in other places like Gaza. As war rages in the Middle East, the Gaza region has been under constant and violent bombardment. A lot of civilians were hurt and many children have not only lost their parents and relatives, but also lost their lives to ruthless artillery fire. I saw a TV reporter interviewing a child whose home was bombed and lost his family. The child looks only 11 or 12 years old. Staring into the camera for a long time, he said slowly, "We children here have no chance to grow up." There were no tears in his eyes when he spoke, and there was no sadness on his face, only a disturbing indifference.

Italy

Each year, the Rotary Club of Morimondo Abbazia dedicates a medal to a charity in honor of the late Ambrogio Locatelli, one of its charter members. In March 2023, the 33-member club designated the Italian office of the nonprofit Rise Against Hunger as the award recipient. In collaboration with the organization, the club gathered 140 Rotarians, family members, friends, and Rotaractors to assemble 17,000 meals for a school in Zimbabwe. The volunteers sorted and weighed rice, soy, and dried vegetables and packed them into bags, which were boxed along with drawings and notes from local children. The effort, which cost about \$9,000, was funded by Rotarians and the Locatelli family, says Davide Carnevali, a member of the Milan-area club.





Portugal

The Rotary Club of Almancil International takes an active approach in its mission to serve children, notably those with autism spectrum disorders or Down syndrome. Members sponsor activities including surfing lessons and animal therapy. In June the club unveiled a sensory room at a school to serve students ages 5 to 16. "The room is now complete, with state-of-the-art equipment including a soothing waterbed, music, and many sensory light and factile objects," says club member Peter Hinze, who coordinated the project. "[It] can provide a sense of calm and help improve [students'] visual and auditory skills and help regulate their behavior." The project cost more than \$16,000. The club provided about \$5,000, with businesses and friends donating the remainder.

Jamaica

Advocates in Jamaica highlight a shortage of housing that meets the needs of people with limited mobility. The Rotary Club of Kingston funded a nearly \$23,000 refurbishment of Cheshire Village, a transitional housing facility associated with a rehabilitation center. "Rotarians were instrumental and involved in the three town halls we had with residents," says Karsten Johnson, the club's immediate past president. "Our plans were made based on their priorities." The Kingston club, supported by donations from the Rotary Club of Naples North, Florida, raised the height of toilets and added support bars and railings along restroom walls. The club installed new kitchen cupboards, sinks, and faucets to improve accessibility for people who use wheelchairs. A first phase, to install six solar streetlights, was completed in February, with the retrofit finished in June.

Philippines

With two club leaders being registered nutritionist dietitians, the Rotary Club of Lucena University District takes healthy eating seriously. The club paired with the Quezon chapter of the Nutritionist-Dietitians' Association of the Philippines to offer lessons at a jail on how diet can prevent disease, the importance of exercise, sleep, and drinking enough water, and other topics. Club President Joey Kathlyn Samonte and Past President Bella Castro also explained a food chart on optimal portion sizes for various food groups. And aspiring chefs tested their skills in a cooking contest using the organic vegetables grown at the jail. Club member Jasper Panganiban lauds the pair's devotion. "These types of projects to encourage healthy lifestyles and diets in the community are close to their hearts," Panganiban says.



Finland

Rotary members are working with the *Finnish Environment Institute* to collect, categorize, and measure trash in the Baltic Sea. "Scientists have little time for this kind of work," explains Liisa Stjernberg, a past governor of District 1420 and a member of the Rotary Club of Helsinki City West. Stjernberg, the Finland country coordinator for the Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group, leads a group of volunteer members from her district who monitor blue algae blooms, raise funds for research, and promote marine conservation. In September the group enlisted 22 Rotary Youth Exchange students to join a measurement outing off the islands of Suomenlinna. They fished out trash including polymer fibers and shock tube detonators used in construction, Stjernberg says. Afterward they took up their oars for another cause: the Rotary-led "Rowing for Herring" longboat regatta, which drew 300 participants.


























Wish Wagon 2024



















