







Recently, social media has been buzzing with ads for "Valentine's Day specials" and "limited-time Valentine's offers," leaving me scratching my head: hasn't Valentine's Day already passed for some time? A closer look reveals that these promotions refer to the Chinese Qixi Festival 七夕, often known as "Chinese Valentine's Day."




This traditional holiday brings to mind the love story of the humble cowherd 牛郎and the celestial weaver 織女. Their love is profound yet forbidden, separated by the celestial rules that dictate lives. The Queen Mother of Heaven 王母娘娘has drawn a silver river to keep them apart, allowing them to meet only once a year on the seventh day of the seventh lunar month, crossing a bridge of magpies. This heart-wrenching tale has endured for millennia, embodying the essence of deep affection.





Looking around, it seems that modern "Valentine's Days" are proliferating. February 14 is the Western Valentine's Day, followed by March 14, which is White Day—an occasion for reciprocating gifts. Then there's May 20, which has become a popular day for confessions due to its phonetic resemblance to "I love you" in Putonghua. Now even Qixi 七夕has been repackaged as the "Eastern Valentine's Day," turning love into a year-round commercial opportunity. Love appears to be everywhere, often commodified, raising questions about how much of the original significance of these celebrations remains.



Amidst this landscape, the Rotary Club of Tai Po has a unique opportunity. Borrowing similar theme and aligning its community service initiatives, our club can enhance its public image. It appears all a matter of packaging. Say, we engage in projects that promote a particular theme (which can be love and compassion)—like, as Sim Sim is planning, "Women Back to Work"—it can resonate with the spirit of some suitable festivals. Or, nearer in time, Danny's Moon Cake gifting to the Homeless coincides with Mid-Autumn Festival. Elevating Rotary's visibility during such festive times can foster a stronger connection with the community, showcasing RC Tai Po not just as a service organization but as a champion of love and unity.

Rotary's People of Action Honors

For over a century, Rotary has committed itself to addressing the needs of communities across the globe. In recognition of this commitment, Rotary honors six projects each year that create change - not only in member communities, but around the world. These projects demonstrate how Rotary members are truly people of action and highlight impactful, sustainable, and scalable projects that are models of service for clubs around the world. For more than 10 years, the People of Action Honors have brought attention to Rotary projects related to disease prevention, mental health, community development, education, youth empowerment, sustainability, and many more areas of service.

At the end of last Rotary year, 2024-25 RI President Stephanie Urchick recognized six members and alumni as Champions of Peace. This honor celebrates the recipients' work to build peace around the world. Their ambitious and wide-ranging efforts include teaching technical skills to refugee children and promoting sustainable agriculture.



Rita Aggarwal, RC Nagpur, Maharashtra, India Project: Wellness in a Box—Nagpur

A consulting psychologist for 35 years, Aggarwal established Manodaya in 1992, a private mental health clinic in central India. She is an officer of the Mental Health Initiatives Rotary Action Group (MHIRAC). The MHIRAC had developed a toolkit called Wellness in a Box, and Aggarwal applied it in her hometown of Nagpur. The project created a curriculum for 14-year-olds that covered depression awareness and coping skills, which helped counter the stigma that surrounds mental health care.



Steve Dudenhoefer, Rotary Club of Puerto Barrios, Izabal, Guatemala

Project: Guatemalan Tomorrow Fund

Dudenhoefer founded the Guatemalan Tomorrow Fund (GTF) and Asociación Ak' Tenamit 33 years ago, after moving from US to Guatemala to serve as a full-time volunteer accompanying rural Indigenous Central American communities in their sustainable development processes. The GTF helped develop a program of work-based learning and job placement for young Indigenous people in the country. 1,000 Indigenous girls and boys receive vocational training at rural residential schools. Community education promoters visited communities to recruit students and offer scholarships.



Amal El-Sisi, Rotary Club of El Tahrir, Egypt Project: Heart2Heart

El-Sisi is a longtime Rotarian, professor of pediatrics, and a member of The Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisers. For four years, El-Sisi led Heart2Heart, which helps children in remote parts of Egypt, Kenya, Libya, and Yemen who have heart conditions. El-Sisi recruited 30 local Rotary clubs and 10 clubs in other countries to collaborate on the project. Rotary members also raised funds and secured global grants for the project and used surveys of community members and care providers to measure its success. The project treats children born with heart disease through state-of-the-art, less invasive catheterization procedures.



Evangeline Buella Mandia, Rotary Club of Marinduque North, Marinduque, Philippines

Project: Mangrove Rehabilitation and Aqua-silviculture Project

Mandia is the club Foundation chair and a past president of the Rotary Club of Marinduque North and dean of the College of Environmental Studies at Marinduque State College. She is a member of The Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisers. The project addressed the decline in mangrove populations in parts of Marinduque. This decline, caused by deforestation, pollution, and climate change, has increased coastal erosion, degraded water quality, and caused a loss of biodiversity. Rotary members raised funds to plant mangrove seedlings and rehabilitate established forests as well as train community members in mangrove propagation and aquaculture.



Bindi Rajasegaran, Rotary Club of Ipoh Central, Perak, Malaysia

Project: National Coalition for Mental Wellbeing

Rajasegaran is a past Rotary club president and past governor of District 3300. A member of the Advisory Council to Malaysia's Ministry of Health, she helped establish the National Coalition for Mental Wellbeing in 2019. Rajasegaran's project addressed youth mental health. The project helped school counselors develop their crisis management skills through a Mental Health First Aid certification course. It also showed counselors how to foster supportive and inclusive school environments that promote mental wellness and reduce stigma.



Walley Temple, Rotary Club of Calgary, Alberta, Canada Project: Towards the Elimination of Cervical Cancer in Guatemala

Temple is a professor emeritus in the Department of Oncology at the University of Calgary and the Tom Baker Cancer Centre. He established a Royal College-approved training program in surgical oncology that has drawn trainees from around the world. Temple's project sought to identify and treat the conditions that lead to cervical cancer, a disease that one in 33 women in Guatemala will contract in their lifetime. Under the project, teams of clinicians conducted training, did examinations, and provided treatment. The project has screened more than 8,000 women, educated more than 3,000 women about cervical cancer, and trained and certified 65 health care practitioners.

District Preserve Planet Earth Seminar

16 August 2025 (Extract report from District 3450 PPE Webpage)

The District PPE Seminar 2025-26 was successfully held on August 16 at The Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups Jockey Club Media 21 (M21). Nearly 90 District leaders, Rotary members, and guests gathered to witness Rotary's unwavering commitment to promoting environmental protection and sustainable development.





The event commenced with a welcoming speech by PP Wendy Lee, Chair of the District PPE Committee. This was followed by the screening of the two documentaries *The Colour of Ice* and highlights of a report on the Tianshan glaciers in Xinjiang, sparking profound reflection among attendees on the global climate crisis.

The seminar featured renowned polar explorer Dr. Rebecca Lee Lok Sze, who shared her valuable polar expedition experiences; followed by the two guest speakers from the Jockey Club Museum of Climate Change (MOCC), Chinese University of Hong Kong, Dr. Felix Leung, who discussed actionable strategies for Hong Kong people to address climate change; and Mr. K.C. Wong introduced the museum's educational initiatives in glacier conservation. The presentations were both insightful and inspiring.


Day 1 26 Aug. Arrival & Lunch




























Day 1 26 Aug. RCMSL Installation of Officers Party






