Happy Chinese New Year, and Kung Hei Fat Choi! 🞉 As we welcome the Year of the Loong 🐎, I am filled with warm wishes for each of you. May you enjoy vibrant health, abundant luck, and a year rich with prosperity.

The term "Loong" has sparked some debate as a preferred translation over "Dragon," reflecting a shift to embrace the unique qualities of this revered symbol in Chinese culture. This effort seeks to differentiate the Chinese dragon from its Western counterparts, often depicted as fearsome beasts. The loong is an awe-inspiring blend of various animals, with the body of a snake, the head of a horse, the mouth of an ox, the eyes of a rabbit, the scales of a fish, eagle talons, and deer antlers. It is commonly seen soaring amid clouds, sans wings, unlike the dragons of European lore. In Chinese, the word "dragon" or "loong" (意) is woven into many idioms, often symbolizing excellence, authority, nobility, and fortune. appy Year of the Dragon! Let me wish all readers of Tai Post good luck

When I collated information for the "Hello There" article for the last issue of Tai Post, I had a good time reminiscing the good old days through the old photos and the past events. One of my nicknames is "Cinderella" not because I wear glass slippers and not because I dressed like Cinderella at the

District Conference in Disney when I was the Conference Chair. It is all because I belong to those who need to sleep early (and believe in the good of sleeping early) and so must return home before midnight – as if under the 'curfew' spell imposed by Cinderella's fairy godmother.



In the not-too-distant past, a friend sent me an interview article of a Chinese doctor (of some fame I think), who challenged the popular belief that "getting to sleep before 11 in the evening nourishes the liver" as complete nonsense. That doctor professed that he stays up all night and drinks alcohol, but his liver function was still strong, and so on ... and so on. "Late-sleepers" use such medical authority to back their habit and laugh at others as being too sensitive and wasting precious night time.



The other camp, with whom yours truly side with, says that the idea about nourishing the liver is based on the yin-yang and five-element theories of Chinese culture. You must first agree with this hypothesis before you can practise it. Of course, the intangible yin-yang and five-element do not sit well with the empirical logic of Western science. That doctor used logic as the criterion to assert that the theory of 'nourishing the liver' is unsustainable.

To me, a person's health is affected by too many factors, including genes, environment, external forces, mutations ... to determine whether liver can be nourished. Using just one person's experience as the yardstick is by itself unscientific. Just like Comrade Deng Xiaoping. He smoked and drank until he was over 90 years old; yet it does not mean that smoking and drinking are good for health or not harmful to health.





I think that when you reach a certain age, you will inevitably tend to err on the side of caution that you "would rather believe than not." So long as you think one practice is of no harm, then give it a try. Even if it is useless, it will not be harmful. The key word here is "just in case". What if it is effective?

Seriously, other people's opinions and experiences belong to "others". You understand your own needs best. If the belief is that going to bed early can help nourish the liver, then go to bed early. It is not a big deal. A good night wasted? If you do not go to bed early, you won't be able to get up early.

If you don't get up early, you will also miss the peace and comfort of the early morning, which is also a waste. Choose one or the other. Life is always a matter of trading off, isn't it?

If I am not in bed past midnight ... no, I won't turn to wearing rags like Cinderella, but my eyes will reduce to slits as I could easily doze off anytime. So, even if it is debatable whether going to bed before 11 pm does nourish the

> liver, I shall stick to sleeping early and that's the pattern I shall adhere to in the Year of the Dragon.

Mending hearts: 777 lives saved and counting

t all began with the tragic death of a young man awaiting surgery for a congenital heart issue. Our Rotary Club of Chandigarh, India, and our Inner Wheel friends had been raising money for the young man. Determined that no other person in need of corrective surgery would die from lack of money, we were moved to act, and our initiative, a part of Gift of Life International, came to be. That was May 1998. We received a grant from The Rotary Foundation in 2000 and combined that with funds from District 3080 (India), District 2630 (Japan), our club, and the Rotary club of Ebingen, Japan.

Today, we have saved 777 lives and counting. During a ceremony for the 100th surgery in 2004, the father of a young man from Pakistan who had received a surgery said, "Pakistan gave him birth, but India gave him life." Realizing the impact of the project in saving the lives of children suffering from congenital heart disease who could not afford surgery, our club rechristened our efforts as the Heartline Project, signed a memorandum of understanding with Fortis Hospital, Mohali, and continued to help children. The team of surgeons handled everything from a hole in the heart, to a faulty heart valve, to other congenital heart problems.

Signature project



This became our club's signature project, funded by Rotary members, Rotary clubs, friends of Rotary and - most importantly grants from The Rotary Foundation. We never faced a shortage of funds because we were in the business of saving lives. The project has been running for 24 years and going strong. We passed milestones, reaching out to children from across borders and continents. We started getting requests from neighboring countries in the Indian subcontinent. Our club responded, and the Heartline Project has helped 34 children from Pakistan, 3 from Afghanistan, 8 from Mongolia, and 18 from Nepal.

Past RI President Rajendra K. Saboo, a member of our club, received numerous requests from even further away. Always eager to help, he would accept and assemble a team of doctors for another medical mission. We have had the opportunity to help 22 children from Malawi, 7 from Uganda, 6 from Nigeria, 50 from Rwanda, and 10 from Zimbabwe. One child from Iraq was also operated on. These add to the more than 600 children belonging to very poor Indian families who have benefited from the project.



Presidential visit



Rotary International President R. Gordon R. McInally and his wife, Heather, visited Fortis Hospital on 17 January. They met with Saboo and our district governor, Arun Mongia. They also met Anu, an 81/2year-old girl from Mohali, who had undergone a successful operation a day earlier. They also met 16-year-old Daphne from Zimbabwe, who arrived a day earlier with her mother for her corrective surgery. She had received a previous surgery in 2016 at the age of 9 but was informed then that she would need another corrective surgery at a later date. Our club assured her and her mother that this would be done. On 22 January, she received her surgery and is recovering well. The Rotary Club of Chitungwiza, Zimbabwe, provided funds for Daphne's travel to India.

McInally also met the team of cardiac surgeons and expressed his gratitude for their service in saving children's lives. He presented a citation to Fortis Hospital Mohali on behalf of our Rotary club. Later he visited six children who were operated upon in the last few months.

This is Rotary in action. Together we create hope for children across borders to have normal, healthy lives.



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


Heartwarming Creation of the Tai Po Mural 心繁大埔壁畫創作 20.01.2024

and members of the Rotary Club of Tai Po.


















Rotary Club's logo.
































































Following the ceremony, members of the Club walked together to a nearby restaurant, 新鹿鳴居,

Lucky PP Wilson took home the raffle gift of two bottles of red wine given out by PDG Kenneth.







2024.01.29 Youth Night Meeting


















The attractive speaker and of course the attractive topic had attracted a large turnout.

PP Wilson Lam briefed us on his latest passion with regards to Chinese Wines (developed during the COVID time when he was detained in the PRC) and




introduced us his partner in wines Mr. Yao to give us more in-depth information about Maotai.
