**2025 Rotary International Convention in Calgary, Canada** From RI News Jun 2025



CALGARY (21-25 June 2025) As Rotary's International convention in Calgary draws to a close, some 16,000 Rotary members and participants from over 140 countries will bring home indelible memories, renewed connections, and an inspired sense of purpose for helping to create a healthier and more peaceful world.

Often described by attendees as a "mini-United Nations", the convention served as a hub for Rotary members and participants to connect and learn from each other and a range of experts on how to take action to address issues in their communities. Welcomed by Alberta Premier Danielle Smith and Calgary Mayor Jyoti Gondek and further inspired by Academy Awardwinning actor Geena Davis and many others — issues addressed ranged from gender parity, children's education, artificial intelligence, preventing and treating cervical cancer, ending polio, and furthering world peace and understanding.

This week, Rotary announced the extension of its joint commitment of up to US\$450 million with the Gates Foundation to end polio, a Rotary-led peacebuilding program to help strengthen communities affected by conflict in Colombia, and a partnership with Symbiosis International University to establish a Rotary Peace Center in India.

The Convention concluded in a spirit of fellowship and rejuvenation. Addressing the event's closing general session, RI President Stephanie A. Urchick urged members to recognize the power of their relationships. "Rotary's most powerful asset has always been you, our members. But we are only as strong as the people who stand beside us," she said. "We talk a lot about goals and strategy. But without friendship, without encouragement, none of it takes hold. Rotary works because we belong here. ... This is our community, and it matters."

The session also featured Rotary's future leaders. President-elect Francesco Arezzo described his commitment to the 2025-26 presidential message, *Unite for Good*. "[It] means involving all members, but not only members, in our service. It means involving [partner] organizations ... local administrations, other voluntary associations. In short, it means 'expand our reach,'" said Arezzo, who was selected earlier this month as the next president. "Let us create one great shared dream that unites us, that excites us, that changes the world and changes our lives, too."





Attendees spent the morning exploring various ways to maximize their impact. One breakout session, The Amazing Peace Race, explored how clubs can incorporate the eight Pillars of Positive Peace into their projects. The session Literacy Alive focused on the success of an initiative to build early reading skills in children in Belize. A particularly crowded session was hosted by the Rotary Action Group Against Slavery, which fights human trafficking around the world. Earlier in the week, the action group had unveiled a permanent peace pole in downtown Calgary. The breakout session featured Cheryl Perera, founder and president of the Canadian nonprofit OneChild and a nominee for the 2025 Nobel Peace Prize. She told how she—seeking a way to fight child trafficking while still a teenager — served as a decoy for a government sting operation in Sri Lanka.

Perera aided in the capture and arrest of a perpetrator. The experience cemented her commitment to the issue and was part of what led her to found OneChild, which mobilizes children and teens to raise awareness about child trafficking. In the House of Friendship exhibition hall, it was impossible to miss a 20-foot-tall tipi sponsored by Rotary District 5360 (parts of Alberta and Saskatchewan, Canada). The tipi was equipped with numerous learning tools to inform visitors about the concerns of Indigenous peoples.

Many attendees were already looking forward to upcoming gatherings. The chair of the 2026 Taipei Convention Committee, Andreas von Möller, enthusiastically invited attendees to the 2026 Rotary International Convention in Taipei, Taiwan (June 13-17, 2026)



The Rotary Club of Taipei's Year of Giving

The Rotary Club of Taipei looks forward to a year of service that links hands and hearts with communities both near and far. We aim to blend international outreach with meaningful local engagement at home in Taiwan.

Our international programs continue to grow in scope and impact. In **Myanmar**, the **Happy Smile** dental initiative enters its second year with our next trip scheduled for November 2025, while a new dental clinic is being set up in a Rangoon charity hospital. In **India**, we are partnering with RC Sarasota Sunrise and RC Ascot Fort on *Restoring Smiles*, a two-year program beginning January 2026 that will bring much-needed dental care to underserved communities.





Our commitment to education extends to **Indonesia**, where we provide support to purchase school supplies in Malang, and our members will join RC Singapore for their annual education project visit this September. In Vietnam, *Our Better Angels* will create learning opportunities for children with disabilities through teacher training, digital tools, and family awareness programs.

Environmental stewardship remains a priority. We are exploring a project with Rotary Club of Kota Kinabalu Pearl to restore mangrove and grow firefly habitat protection in Sabah, **Malaysia**. We are assessing a project to preserve wetlands and near extinction pond frogs and snakes in Northern Taiwan.

In **Cambodia**, a prison dental ministry will receive dental care supplies funded by our club. We are also helping to restore mobility in Nepal by funding new wheelchairs in collaboration with RC Dulihel.

Closer to home, our community service activities will focus on strengthening relationships and meeting local needs. This November, we will sponsor and host a **Thanksgiving lunch** for children from the Holy Word Foundation and join the St Anne's Children Home Christmas Fair.

There is a **Resident Day** being planned for March-April 2026 that will bring together students from Taipei European School (TES) and Tamsui Elementary School for cultural exchange, sports, and fellowship. A **winter soup kitchen** is being planned with TES or the French Chamber of Commerce that will warm both stomachs and spirits. In the spring, there will be a project that focuses on the cooking skills of youths from the Xindian Juvenile Welfare Service Center - "**The Rotary Table - Serving with Smiles**".

Our Vocational Service will spotlight members' expertise, with planned talks on the automobile industry, a hands-on culinary experience in October, and a career panel introducing students to diverse industries.

Our **remote English learning** projects will continue in partnership with Asia American International Academy (AAIA)/ Cha-Cheng Hot Spring Branch Elementary School and TES-Tamsui Elementary School, with an in person meet-and-greet planned for the autumn and a closing ceremony in early summer 2026.

Looking ahead, we are exploring ways to enhance our annual signature project - English Social Solutions Contest (ESSC). The contest challenges students in Taiwan to identify and propose actionable solutions to social problems, fostering community engagement and leadership development. The contest's semi-final and final are being planned for March 2026.

From Myanmar to Malang, from Taipei to Nepal, our club is committed to building lasting friendships, creating sustainable change, and living the Rotary motto of *Service Above Self*. The year ahead promises both challenges and opportunities, and together, we will continue to transform lives—one project, one community, and one connection at a time.







Rotary Club of Tai Po Services Plan for 2025-26 Service Chair, Danny Lau This coming Rotary year, I planned community projects and a transparent working budget of HK \$158,000. Below you'll find a friendly walk-through of each initiative and how every dollar will translate into hope, dignity, and opportunity for our neighbours.

### 1. SSSS Mid-Autumn Festival Visit (30 Sep 2025) — HK \$7,000

Our year begins under the lantern light of the Mid-Autumn Festival. On 8 September, we'll once again visit SSSS (Street Sleepers Shelter Society). Together we'll donate mooncakes and remind our street-sleeping friends that community has room for everyone. The modest HK \$7,000 allocation covers mooncakes and small care-pack gifts.



### 2. Tai Po Career Expo — HK \$20,000

For over a decade we've partnered with the Civil Service Bureau to help secondary students explore career pathways. This year's Tai Po Career Expo will invite club members to share professional journeys, and even scout potential Interactors or Rotaractors! Your out-of-office stories can plant seeds of ambition — two vibrant futures for the price of one. Budget items include venue rental, marketing materials, and light refreshments.





### 3. School Abseiling Adventure — HK \$20,000

Adventure builds confidence. In partnership with Tai Po Heung Secondary School—or any other school suggested by members—we'll provide a safe abseiling opportunity so that teens can build confidence, understand themselves, and have courage in the face of gravity. Allocation covers certified instructors, safety gear, and insurance. Got a favorite school? Let me know!



### 4. Star Reaching Youth Project — HK \$20,000

Our long-running Star Reaching Project supports at-risk youth teetering on society's margins. Mentoring sessions, life-skills workshops, and weekend excursions give these young people the "nudge" they need to choose productive paths. HK \$20,000 will fund venue hire, workshop supplies, and mini-grants for vocational training.

### 5. President Mac's Service Allowance — HK \$10,000

Great leadership deserves flexible fuel. Last year President Mac organized an unforgettable elderly-care program. This year we're setting aside HK \$10,000 so the President can seize similar service opportunities quickly—whether that's covering transport to another NGO's joint project or buying materials for an impromptu eldercare day.



# 6. District Grant: Women Back-to-Work Initiative — HK \$30,000

President-elect Sim-sim is passionate about helping women reenter the workforce after family or health interruptions. We target the District Grant rebate \$80,000 full. Yet, according to experience, we'd better make a conservative budget plan. HK \$30,000 in case it is not fully granted. Imagine the ripple effect when a mother regains confidence, income — and the power to inspire her children.





### 9. Area 6 - Joint Schools Career Expo— HK \$10,000

Because career dreams have no district borders, we're co-hosting a larger expo across Area 6. Funds will underwrite logistics so dozens of schools can attend free of charge. Expect wider reach, richer speaker panels, and chances to crosspollinate service ideas.

### 7. Elderly "Disco 4 All" (4 sessions) — HK \$20,000

Remember the joy we sparked last year at Quarry Bay's seniors' dance? We're scaling up! Four mobile "Disco 4 All" parties will roll into community centers and even care homes —wheelchairs welcome. Your participant and big smiles can make a difference; the budget funds a DJ, portable dance floor, and volunteer transport.

### 8. Area 6 - Clean Water Project — HK \$15,000

Water is life, yet safe water remains a luxury for too many. Area 6 as a team, we'll finance filtration units and hygiene workshops for a rural school network. HK \$15,000 purchases hardware, while sweat equity from members turns taps—and futures—clear.

# 10. **Area 6 - Operation "Brightness"** (Eye-Care Mission) — HK \$6,000

Following AG Sally's suggestion, we're piloting Operation Brightness. A small HK \$6,000 goes a long way.
