believe the first victim under the Pandemic when everyone is mask-covered, must be the lovely smile. Whenever I walk on the street, cross the road, meet familiar neighbors, bump into good friends ... I nod my head, say hello just like before; but the smile I look forward to is gone. Some wise people painted a smiley face on the mask as a sort of comfort,

but how possibly can it compare with a broad sunny smile? A kind smile is an important diplomatic tool, an effective friendly ambassador. Now that the smiley face is masked, there is one

less tool to militate hostility or mediate disputes.



Smiles and laughter have a special charm. When you smile, you usually receive a smile back at almost the same time, as if you are looking into a mirror. Now that a mask covers your face, the biggest victim may be yourself because you see fewer smiles, and thus you will smile less. According to psychologists, laughing can often be a form of relief as it drives away depression. So, the less you laugh, the less you are psychologically self-regulating.

All faces are different and that enables identification. However, under the mask, faces are only partially visible and everyone becomes mysterious. The only differentiating features are hairstyle, eyes and clothes. This in turn, seriously affects the forming of friendship. You see, when meeting recently acquainted friends, you may need to reconfirm that the person before you is actually the same new acquaintance. If s/he changes hairstyle or changes clothes, you may not be able to immediately tell the identity. There were indeed a number of times when someone who seemed familiar walked past me but I hesitated to say hello; and because of that hesitation, s/he

walked away and I was then left only with my own imagination whether I do know that someone or not. What face hides underneath that mask I wonder ... without answer. You cannot easily tell who is who anymore.


Highlights of Rotary Council on Legislation 2022

From report at D3450 District Conference & Report of Action

ROTARY INFORMATIC

PETER LAM he Council on Legislation (COL) meets every three years and is an essential part of Rotary's governance. The representatives -- one from each Rotary district -- review and vote on proposals that seek to change Rotary's constitutional documents and on resolutions that express an opinion or make a recommendation to the Rotary International

remotely from their home country on-line. So only 325 representatives participated in-person at the Hyatt Regency in Chicago on 10-14 April; same location as the 2019 council. PDG Ada Cheng represented our district to participate in this event online and she had given us a presentation during our recent District Conference on 28-29 May at Nina Hotel Tsuen Wan West. Here are the highlights:



Statistics

- No. of Representatives: 523
- Attendance: 325 (physical), 198 (virtual)
- 94 enactments transmitted to the Council: 29 enactments adopted, 51 proposals rejected, 13 items withdrawn, 1 item postponed indefinitely

Some Adopted Enactments

Club Administration

Clubs have 30 days (instead of 60) after all board meetings to provide the written minutes to their members (22-07)

Membership

- Added "equity & inclusion" to the building of a well-balanced membership (22-10)
- Members no longer must work or reside in the locality of their club (22-13)
- Active members can propose prospective members in any club (22-14)
- Satellite club members can come from multiple clubs (22-15) (Standard Rotary Club Constitution Article 8 Membership Section 5: Prohibited Dual Memberships. No member shall simultaneously a) belong to this and another club other than a satellite of a club, or b) be an honorary member in this club

Per Capita Dues

Each club pays per capita dues to RI per member set at US\$35.50 per half year in 2022-23. This will increase to US\$37.50 per half year in 2023-24, US\$39.25 per half year in 2024-25, and US\$41 per half year in 2025-26 (22-46)

Rotary International - Finances

By 30 September each year, the RI Budget shall be published as decided by the board on RI's website and brought to the attention of all clubs. The general secretary shall publish the audited annual report no later than 31 December after the fiscal year end.

Club Meetings and Attendance

- Allowed Rotaractors to attend any Rotary club meetings (22-84)
- Removed the monthly attendance report requirement of clubs to the governor
- For Standard Rotary Club Constitution Article 10 Attendance Section 5 Excused Absences, A member's absence shall be excused if "The sum of the member's age and years of membership in one or more clubs is 85 years or more, and the member has been a Rotarian for at least 20 years. Board Approval requirement to this excuse is now removed by the Adopted Enactment 22-92.

According to PDG Ada Cheng, clubs are required to adopt the new club constitution and should review their bylaws to ensure conformity with the new constitutions and bylaws as a result of the COL changes.

Sunshine Teens Abseiling Event





off to the bottom immediately. The challenge of abseiling in school is the gaps between the balcony of each floor. The more you leaned back, the greater swings your body will experience.



We had a short Bingo session which brought the event to the hottest atmosphere. Then great congratulations to the news of Creamy and Frankie having a grandson.


























There were a lot of blessings over the tables! Along with the selected Sichuan dishes, we had a delightful evening with the long-lasting spice burns in our mouths.

We had excellent food and of course a wonderful fellowship. The event ended with laughter and emptied bottles of liquors and wine.






















18 July 2022


