Dear Fellow Rotarians:

31st October 2020 was a big day for RC Tai Po, not only for our 30th club installation, more importantly it marked one of our club milestones in chartering a new satellite club: Rotary Satellite Club of Tai Po – Companion, which was admitted to RI District 3450 on 21st October 2020. It was a fruitful journey from the beginning (as early as my club plan presentation in July 2020) and finally to witness our dream come true in 4-month time. The beauty of our satellite club is of two folds: firstly, we create a transitional platform for our Rotaractors to become Rotarians and they could continue to be companion to each other in their personal and Rotary lives; secondly, with more flexibility in the satellite club, we could attract young professionals as new members from all walks of life to join and to “taste” what Rotary is about. The future is our next generation, it is of paramount importance that they could gather strength and take action in serving our community (as a companion to those who are in need) alongside with their daily routine.



Diversity is one of the signatures in Rotary clubs. I believe that “Harmony in Diversity” (和而不同) is the foundation for membership to grow. There are also few initiatives from Rotary International to make Rotary diverse. Collaboration with Toastmaster is one of the moves. The selection of the first woman leader Jennifer E. Jones who comes from Ontario as RI President for 2022-23 is another example. In her speech, she said “I believe that diversity, equity and inclusion... begins at the top. For us to realize growth in female membership and members under the age of 40, these demographics need to see their own reflection in leadership. I will champion double-digit growth in both categories while never losing sight of our entire family.” And I am pretty much looking forward to this new page in the organization’s 115-year history.

To conclude, the wider the door we open, the more the people we could meet and include in our Rotary lives with new insights and impacts.


EDITOR SAYS



Major achievement focus of Rotary's World Polio Day event RI news Oct. 2020

Rotary's 2020 *World Polio Day Online Global Update program* on 24 October hails this year's historic achievement in polio eradication: Africa being declared free of the wild poliovirus.

Paralympic medalist and TV presenter Ade Adepitan, who co-hosts this year's program, says that the eradication of polio in Africa was personal for him. "Since I was born in Nigeria, this achievement is close to my heart," says Adepitan, a polio survivor who contracted the disease as a child. "I've been waiting for this day since I was young."

He notes that, just a decade ago, three-quarters of all of the world's polio cases caused by the wild virus were contracted in Africa. Now, more than a billion Africans are safe from the disease. "But we're not done," Adepitan cautions. "We're in pursuit of an even greater triumph — a world without polio. And I can't wait."

Rotary Foundation Trustee Geeta Manek, who co-hosts the program with Adepitan, says that World Polio Day is an opportunity for Rotary members to be motivated to "continue this fight." She adds, "Rotarians around the world are working tirelessly to support the global effort to end polio."

• A collective effort

Dr. Tunji Funsho, chair of Rotary's Nigeria PolioPlus Committee and a member of the Rotary Club of Lekki Phase 1, Lagos State, Nigeria, tells online viewers that the milestone could not have been reached without the efforts of Rotary members and leaders in Africa and around the world.



Funsho, who was recently [named one of TIME magazine's 100 Most Influential People of 2020](#), says countless Rotarians helped by holding events to raise awareness and to raise funds or by working with governments to secure funding and other support for polio eradication. "Polio eradication is truly a collective effort ... This accomplishment belongs to all of us," says Funsho.

Rotary and its members have contributed nearly \$890 million toward polio eradication efforts in the African region. The funds have allowed Rotary to award PolioPlus grants to fund polio surveillance, transportation, awareness campaigns, and National Immunization Days. This year's World Polio Day Online Global Update is streamed on Facebook in several languages and in a number of time zones around the world. The program, which is sponsored by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, features Jeffrey Kluger, editor at large for TIME magazine; Mark Wright, TV news host and member of the Rotary Club of Seattle, Washington, USA; and Angélique Kidjo, a Grammy Award-winning singer who performs her song "M'Baamba."

• The challenges of 2020

It is impossible to talk about 2020 without mentioning the coronavirus pandemic, which has killed more than a million people and devastated economies around the world. In the program, a panel of global health experts from Rotary's partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) discusses how the infrastructure that Rotary and the GPEI have built to eradicate polio has helped communities tackle needs caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, too.

Panelists also include Dr. Christopher Elias, president of the Global Development Division of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation; Henrietta H. Fore, executive director of UNICEF; and Rebecca Martin, director of the Center for Global Health at the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

• The future of the fight against polio

Rotary's challenge now is to eradicate the wild poliovirus in the two countries where the disease has never been stopped: Afghanistan and Pakistan. Routine immunizations must also be strengthened in Africa to keep the virus from returning there.

To eradicate polio, multiple high-quality immunization campaigns must be carried out each year in polio-affected and high-risk countries. During the COVID-19 pandemic, it is necessary to maintain populations' immunity against polio while also protecting health workers from the coronavirus and making sure they do not transmit it.

Area 6 Joint Clubs Meeting cum District Governor's Visit

I had said so before and I shall say it again: Joint Area 6 Meetings are not the sort of meetings I'd hugely look forward to. More often than not, such meetings dwindled into the same routine announcements, own club chatting and boring speeches. This year, with the COVID-19 restrictions also in place, the Area 6 Joint Club District Governor's Visit on 19 October 2020 was as uneventful as could be imagined.



The 11 clubs in Area 6 invited District Governor Eric Chak to a joint visit. Like in past years, the poor Governor and his team spent the whole afternoon of 19 October having "DG Private Session" with board of directors and chairpersons of individual clubs to go over club plans, visions and targets for the coming year.



Soon after the Private Sessions came the joint session/dinner meeting. As the social distancing restrictions were in place, tables were divided by plastic panels to limit seating to 4 persons each. After playing the Rotary Anthem (without lyrics), each of the 11 club presidents reported on recent club events which were mostly about the giving of face masks during pandemic times and/or the successful District Grant approval. Only Rotary Club of Tai Po President Sally announced the good news of the formation and impending charter of our Satellite Club. Then DG Eric was invited to speak.



There were then photo sessions and new member induction. Neither the presidents nor the people from the District had attempted to make this meeting interesting; and so the evening ended unmemorable and uneventful. The only merit of this meeting appeared to be the chance to really meet and greet old friends from fellow Area 6 clubs after a long absence of physical meetings.



End Polio Walk

Polio is the world's forgotten disease and something that should have been made history a long time ago. It is a crippling and potentially fatal infectious disease. There is no cure, but there are safe and effective vaccines. The strategy to eradicate polio is therefore based on preventing infection by immunizing every child until transmission stops and the world is polio-free.



Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. End Polio Walk is one of the signature events in recent years. We raise funds to help prepare for a Polio free world. Unfortunately, we cannot walk together like previous years due to pandemic. But our President Sally decided to lead, and we walked in a small group on 24.10.2020 and chose the Tai Po Kau Natural Trail (Brown Walk). By taking the advice of experienced hikers, such as PDG Kenneth, PP William, Bebe and Wanda, we completed the 7.8 km trail in 2.5 hrs. What a pity that PP Louis could not join us due to his back pain. But his hiking coach was there to accompany us to finish the walk.



You may be interested to know that Tai Po Kau is an area south of the town of Tai Po in Hong Kong, which was the site of the former Tai Po Kau Station of the Kowloon–Canton Railway. It is located at a river estuary that empties into Tolo Harbour. Like most of Hong Kong, Tai Po Kau was originally forested, but by early last century the hillsides were mostly cleared of trees. In 1926, the government established a plantation here. The main trees were Chinese red pines *Pinus massoniana*, giving rise to the local name for the area: Tsung Tsai Yuen - Pine Garden.

RCTP President Dr. Sally Luk has recorded a Global Healthcare and Rotary Podcast with Henry Wang and Simon Haigh on 7 October 2020. The full podcast was launched globally on 2 November 2020 on YouTube (<https://youtu.be/QMHE-b3GhQQ>) plus multiple global podcast platforms with favourable reception and wide interest. All the global podcasts will be featured on all leading podcast channels, including YouTube, social media and multiple global podcast platforms.

RCTP President Dr. Sally Luk and Nick Northcott, the Chrysalis Advisory Partner from Australia had good discussions on the key healthcare global priorities plus how healthcare organisations from East and West can collaborate better, as summarised below.

Sally said she is currently the Associate Consultant in Department of Surgery, North District Hospital. She obtained her Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery (MBChB) from the Chinese University of Hong Kong in 2005. She then underwent 6-year General Surgical training in Prince of Wales Hospital and became a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeon of Edinburgh and a Fellow of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine in 2012. She further sub-specialised in gastrointestinal surgery with great interest in interventional endoscopy. She underwent post fellowship overseas training in Seoul Korea, including minimally invasive surgical training in Yonsei University and Endoscopic Ultrasound training in the ASAN Medical Centre. She is also the Honorary Clinical Assistant Professor of Department of Surgery at the Chinese University of Hong Kong.

Key Aims and Goals as Rotary Club President

Sally said she is honoured to be the President of Rotary Club of Tai Po for the year 2020-21 after joining Rotary for 6 years. She had also been a Rotaractor for 2 years before she became a Rotarian. She is very keen to create a platform for youth leaders to strengthen their leadership. Sally has 3 main focuses for the key RCTP service projects. Firstly to increase health awareness. Secondly to promote peace and thirdly to preserve planet earth.

Increase Health Awareness

Sally said that the COVID 19 pandemics is a public health emergency. RCTP has donated and distributed thousands of masks and sanitary necessities to vulnerable groups including elderly residential homes to help their fight against Covid. This year, RCTP has also supported a Rotary global grant project with the Rotary Club of Modena Italy, to supply 200,000 level 2 and 3 masks to the hospital healthcare workers and elderly homes in Modena Italy.

Sally highlighted that empowering elderly with healthy aging will be a better approach in global public health. She is a strong advocator of "prevention better than cure". She plans to lead RCTP to promote and build up a healthy elderly community with different NGOs.

Peace Promotion

Every Rotarian is a Peace Builder. Sally and RCTP President elect Wilson Woo have represented RCTP to join the first local HK chapter under Rotary Action Group for Peace (RAGFP). They have formulated various peacebuilder services projects and there are plans for greater international collaboration to shape peace together via various virtual platforms with Rotarians globally.

Preserve Planet Earth

On the new Rotary Preserve Planet Earth (PPE) initiative, she has appointed Henry Wang, an international climate change and clean energy expert, to be the new RCTP PPE Director. She aims for RCTP to be recognized as a Green Club and adopt the new Rotary Green Policy. RCTP will also participate in tree planting, beach cleansing & no-plastic campaigns plus the District PPE forum. Sally stressed that Sustainability and Clean energy will be the key PPE themes for RCTP going forward.

International Collaboration

When Henry asked Sally how she sees Healthcare institutions globally, she said that the medical field nowadays is evidence-based medicine. Over the past two decades, there was tremendous increase in multi-centre cross-national clinical research papers being published. International collaborations have included multi-dimensional genetic studies, basic molecular scientific research, disease pathogenesis, use of advance technology in diagnosis and treatment as well as invention of new drugs etc. Taking COVID 19 pandemics as an example, there are breakthroughs in international collaboration between scientists, microbiologists, epidemiologists, clinical doctors, pharmacists and engineers all over the world. International scientists and microbiologists have decoded the viral RNA genome within few weeks' time. Epidemiologists have collaborated with WHO to provide the most updated epidemiological data which allows us to know more about the route of transmission and clinical features for enhanced surveillance, risk prediction and contact tracing. A number of multi-centre clinical trials were conducted using different drug strategy to treat those with severe infections. Infection disease experts are joining together to give the updated recommendations in preventive measures. Potential vaccines are now in different phases of clinical trials. Engineers are working together to design simplified airway pressure machines for respiratory support and to build large-scale well-equipped isolation facilities for potential community outbreaks.

Technological Advancement

Sally further shared that her top priority in healthcare-led change will be the use of robotics and artificial intelligence in combined endoscopic and surgical procedures. With the advancements in technology, minimally invasive surgery using laparoscopic instruments have become the gold standards in managing many surgical diseases. Patients would experience less pain and have faster recovery with smaller wounds. Sally also shared new revolutionary healthcare changes in Clinical Nutrition and intestinal microbiota. New insights have surfaced from the two large scale Human Microbiome Projects hosted by the US national institutes of Health and European Commission. Taking obesity as an example, there is strong evidence that the gut flora in the obese individual is different which allows more fat/caloric content to be extracted and absorbed into the body.

The Climate

Sally said that looking ahead, the more imminent concern in the coming decade is climate change related health issues. We should not underestimate the effect of extreme climate change on human health. Last year widespread bushfires in Australia killing thousands of wildlife animals were important early warnings. Global warming caused by greenhouse gases have led to extreme heat waves, flooding and drought, rise in sea water level and air pollution. All these would be devastating to mankind if we don't take action now.

Global Big Data

Henry asked Sally how Healthcare organisations in the East & West can collaborate better globally. Sally shared that a key area is openness in real time big data and technology. With the introduction of 5G network, essentially the lag time in data and information exchange is minimal. The positive impacts of having Global Big Data in healthcare will be huge ranging from disease prevention, diagnosis and treatment with life-saving outcome.

Sally highlighted that another important area will be on the healthcare system. When facing the common global health threats like the COVID 19 pandemics and the foreseeable climate change related health diseases, we would need better high-level collaborations to formulate a robust Global health and response system so as to stay ready and react quickly.

Enhancing Global Healthcare Network

Sally said there are still many developing countries with substandard primary healthcare. East west collaboration to provide better quality of care in these developing countries will be another big future challenge. Lack of clean water and electricity in these poor countries will make the situation even more complicated. Raising global fund and enhancing global healthcare networks with humanitarian service providers like Médecins Sans Frontières and Rotary International will be important to improve these.



Simon also asked Nick similar healthcare questions. Nick shared his Australia and global experiences on these during the podcast..

Henry and Simon thanked Sally and Nick for their wonderful participations and insightful comments to an important ground-breaking global podcast which will be of interest to thousands of viewers globally.

Lastly, we returned to the basics: stone, paper and scissors challenge. Guess who was the winner?


