11<sup>th</sup> March (3-11) which passed by recently marked the 1st year anniversary of the Japan Northeastern big Earthquake & Tsunami disaster which still touches the hearts of many of us and here is a recent article from *The Rotarian* magazine about a small service activity that a Rotary Peace Fellow has done to show Rotary cares. I wish our club can continue to do more disaster relief project in Japan to show “our club cares.”

### The View From Japan

If you had minutes to flee a disaster and could take only one item, what would you choose? Most people name a possession that is often impossible to replace: their photos. In Ishinomaki, Japan, which was obliterated by an earthquake and 20-foot tsunami last March, survivors escaped with their lives and nothing else.

Photojournalist Allison Kwesell traveled by bus in November to Ishinomaki from Tokyo, where she is a Rotary Peace Fellow, armed with two cameras, photo albums, and donated Fuji instant film. She joined two photographers who had formed Photohoku, named for the Tohoku region, where the disaster struck. The nonprofit mission aims to help survivors build new albums – and new memories.



“As a journalist, I often feel that I am taking stories from the victims of disasters, war, and poverty,” Kwesell says. “I believe such stories have the power to effect change, but my photos and words might never directly help the people who let me into their lives.”

This trip was different. The team asked survivors if they’d like to pose for photos, then gave them the instant prints. The photographers started albums for them and listened to their experiences.

Kwesell recalls photographing a woman with her grandchildren in front of their temporary home: “She told me she was happy I chose to photograph her there, because it gave her the courage to move forward. She said she believes that one day, she and her family will look back on the photo and remember what they overcame.”

## My first NID experience (Part I)

"Why are you going to New Delhi again? Why don't you go somewhere nice instead?" My friend Sophie asked me casually over our weekly lunch date.

"Because," I replied candidly, "I feel like when I get back from Delhi, all my troubles in Hong Kong would just...melt away."

Being in such a transient and unpredictable stage in my life, I felt the need to push my limits and get into perspective. As a 'Rotary baby', my whole life, I have been taught the obligation to **help** and to **give**. But what I didn't know was the satisfaction and the privilege that come with those two things.

Visiting Delhi has always been on my "bucket list". So when I was offered the opportunity to go there for Rotary National Immunization Day (NID), I had to go for it!

My trip in Delhi was a short one. I arrived late night Saturday and was scheduled to catch the Tuesday (1 am) red eye back to Hong Kong. However, I was determined to make my trip an action packed one.

On the night that we arrived, PDG Ada and I slept for no more than 3 hours before waking up at 6am to visit the *Directorate of Family Welfare*. As we step into the worn down, concrete clinic, I was surprised to find that the ladies have already started working.



Some were chipping ice to keep the Polio Vaccine Vial cool; some were packing the vaccines away into the little grey coolers. Inside a simple, dimmed office,



there were files neatly stacked on a sofa with reference numbers, addresses and details in them, waiting to be distributed to different NID booths. Needless to say, I was blown away by the clever and efficient system.

As Ashok, the Secretary of Delhi Midtown club, quickly fill us in with the situation at the centre, we were wary about disturbing the workers. However, as we make our way around the building, we were greeted with many smiling faces and expressions of hospitality. My heart was immediately warmed and filled with excitement.

As a first time NID participant, I was very lucky to have the chance to observe the distribution process of the vaccine. We sat in a small van and stopped at various locations (such as temples, schools and clinics) to drop off the grey cooler boxes along with their corresponding files. Despite of the language barrier, I was determined to help out by passing the boxes in and out of the van to the driver. With a lot of pointing and gesturing, I felt that my initiative and effort were appreciated.



At around gam, we arrived at the (Rotary club of) *Delhi Midtown Health clinic*. Our "mission" was to learn about the process and help apply vaccine drops to children who come in. As the adorable, little faces show up at the centre, DG David's two girls and I were thrilled to entertain them and give them their vaccine drops.



Some children were extremely obedient and seem to know what they were doing; they'd open their mouths very wide and let us drip the vaccines. On the other hand, some younger children were less thrilled to see. One baby even spat the vaccine in my face as he screamed in horror: Almost like he was thinking "Gross! What you are putting in my mouth?" Of course, with excellent tea effort, we eventually got the two drops of vaccine into his mouth.



About an hour later, I began to feel the fulfillment and hopefulness of a Rotarian. Each child we helped that day would be safe from Polio; hence have better chances for a happy, healthy life.

As we visited more booths that day, we continue to meet more amazing children of India. Initially we thought the 6 - 7 year olds were carrying their siblings to get vaccinated. When a little girl (who couldn't be more than 6) came back the second time with a different toddler in her arms, we asked her if that baby was also her sibling. Turns out they were just neighbors! Due to the Delhi club's tremendous effort in raising awareness on Polio, there appears to be a 'referral system' where young children would volunteer to bring their siblings, friends or neighbors to the health clinic for the vaccination. To think that these young children, who have so little, are capable of such compassion and take it upon themselves to better their community, validates the virtue and passion of Rotary.



Every drop of vaccine represents our hope and blessing to these children. This experience was truly life changing to say the least. It unleashed this passion and hunger inside me to **give and help**. I thought to myself "I wish I could do more...I wish I could do more..."

We went back to the hotel that night feeling impossibly encouraged and pleased. However, nothing could have prepared me for the door-to-door service the next day.


# Centenary Challenge Cup
