Editor Says

2018 is coming to an end; and thinking back, it has not been a good year.

My mum passed away in July and that was saddest day in my life. Dad and I are adapting and coming to terms with this reality. What no one could have expected was that thereafter, a string of death announcements of important and significant people followed. Physicist Professor Charles Kao died in September. Our RAC WYS Rotaractors had accompanied DG YC to pay last respects to this Father of Fiber Optics. Then by the end of October, Chinese literary giant and wuxia novelist Louis Cha, better known by his pen name Jin Yong, died. His novels transcended political, geographical and ideological barriers for Chinese readers. I spent my younger years pouring over his novels and I am still re-reading them from time to time now. Soon after, troubled actress Nam Kit Ying also passed away; followed by “godfather of the Hong Kong film industry”, Raymond Chow who died at the age of 99. He was the one who introduced Bruce Lee to the world. Former Executive Council convenor Chung Sze Yuen died aged 101. Most recently, it was former Undersecretary for Home Affairs Florence Hui Hiu-fai who died at the relatively young age of 44! I still recall the time when she came as guest speaker to our Joint Meeting with Baby Clubs when Ron was president and she showed all the potentials to be the next Cultural Minister.

It is sad that my Facebook page or WhatsApp have been inundated with such messages every 10 days or so. One recent death *who* also left a mark was Billy. Billy is not really some important guy or anyone high up the social ladder. Billy was but a cattle. This news heading in South China Morning Post sums it up:



“Beloved Hong Kong bull Billy found dead with stomach full of plastic bags, prompting call for beachgoers to take their trash home.”

Billy was an eight-year-old bull which lived on Pui O beach at southern Lantau. 6 or 7 years ago, this bull was discovered to have been deeply wounded by dogs. Pui O residents helped it recover and named it Billy. In recent years, it got friendly with tourists and beach goers and it also got into the habit of being fed by visitors. That was how it ended up eating their leftovers. It was reported that an examination showed that Billy’s stomach and intestinal tract had been blocked with enough plastic bags to fill two rubbish bins! That’s pretty alarming!



HK Chief Executive Carrie Lam announced the “Lantau Tomorrow Vision” in her Policy Address. She advocated creation of artificial islands to increase the number of residential units and thus improve people’s livelihood by reducing the average waiting time for public housing. Lantau will surely be the focus of development. The recent opening of the HK Zhuhai Macao Bridge has seen tourists flooding Tung Chung, Lantau. The combined impact on the environment will surely aggravate. Doesn’t the death of Billy ring a bell? And for whom the bell tolls?



Last year, Caren spear-headed our club’s “Plastic and You” Project and knocked us all off balance with stark presentation of the dire plastic damage from which the world is suffering. Our Rotaractors and Interactors alike are still reminiscing the part they each played. The problem is not going away; but at least all of us are made a lot more aware. Let us ‘stop the killing’ by being more alert to environmental protection.

Like I said at the start, 2018 is not a good year. What does that signify? It means matters cannot be worse and so 2019 will definitely turn better! Here is to wish all Tai Post readers a happy, healthy and environmentally friendly New Year!

Rotary Day at the United Nations

RI news Nov. 2018



Innovation was the theme at Rotary Day at the United Nations on 10 November. Nearly a thousand Rotary leaders, members, and guests from around the world met in Nairobi, Kenya, to hear about creative solutions to challenging world problems.

The annual event, held at the only UN headquarters in Africa, recognizes Rotary's long-standing special relationship with the United Nations. UN officials and humanitarian experts inspired participants to find innovative strategies for addressing humanitarian needs both locally and globally.



Six Rotaract and Rotary members age 35 or under were also honored as Rotary People of Action: Young Innovators. All of these leaders spoke about how they used ingenuity to launch efforts that brought about measurable and lasting results.

General sessions and workshops covered the UN Sustainable Development Goals, the technology revolution, and young people's role in creating change. A special session on the environment emphasized the importance of sustainable development and suggested concrete actions that people of all generations can take to build a clean and healthy future.

For the first time, the event also featured an Innovation Fair where Rotary clubs, businesses, and other organizations exhibited projects and cutting-edge technology designed to address humanitarian challenges.

Keynote speakers included RI President Barry Rassin, who is a member of the Rotary Club of East Nassau, New Providence, Bahamas, and Sushil Kumar Gupta, Rotary International president-nominee and a member of the Rotary Club of Delhi Midwest, Delhi, India.

Rassin said the Innovation Fair inspired him to pair Rotary's older generations' resources and experience with the energy and ideas of young people. "We want to take you on as equals, as colleagues," Rassin told the young audience members. "You bring to the table your ideas, your ambitions, your perspective on the world's problems. We help you to enlarge your horizons, to think big, and to make your innovations practical."

He added, "Youth innovators and Rotary can make the impossible possible."

With more young people in the world today than ever before — more than 50 percent of the population is under age 30 — it's imperative for them to harness their talents, said Hanna S. Tetteh, director-general of the United Nations Office at Nairobi. "For a more peaceful and more sustainable world for all, we need the active participation and leadership of young people," said Tetteh. "I'm grateful Rotary is representing that here today."

The paifang is 37.6 meters high and 88 meters wide, decorated with engravings of dragons, lions, birds and gods. It is called China's No.1 Paifang because of its massive size.



Bijiang Golden House 碧江金樓

It is an affluent building in the Ming and Qing Dynasties and has a history of several hundred years. What is especially rare is that the woodcarvings all adopt traditional Chinese themes with infiltration of foreign art style to the Lingnan building culture.



Dinner at 大板橋

Junan steamed pig 均安蒸豬 is a very famous dish in Shunde. It is very fatty but goes well with whiskey.



Day 2 (Saturday)

Boat trip down 古勞水鄉

It was a refreshing experience being driven in a small boat down the waterways of this water town which is located on the bank of the Xijiang River.



A filling lunch at 佛山桂苑。Very tasty! The steamed fish and the fried milk are impeccable.



Foshan Ancestral Temple 佛山祖廟

Foshan Ancestral Temple is a Daoist temple and a national AAAA tourist attraction. In addition to its own cultural relics, the temple's architectural decoration, such as ceramic tiles, brick carvings, wood carvings, etc., are characteristic cultural legacy. The architecture and artefacts are more attractive than the performances at one of its yards.

Sunshine Teens Abseiling Event
